Why Do Members Join?

Knowing why people join a volunteer organization is essential to knowing how to keep them in the organization. There are as many reasons to join a club as there are members. Meeting expectations plays a major role in retaining members. Review the following list and think about how your club and district recognize and respond to the motives for membership:

How are you doing? The list represents just a few reasons why some of your members belong. Is your club meeting the needs of these members?

Welcome and Engage New Members

- ❖ Hold a special induction ceremony for new members.
- Present new members with a GFWC member pin, or state pin.
- Assign a "big sister" or mentor to new members who will make sure the new member is introduced to everyone, can answer questions, and explain unique club traditions.
- Provide name tags for everyone to wear.
- ❖ For a large "class" of new members, encourage them to have their own service project, with an experienced member to provide guidance and help when asked.
- Find out what skills/talents/abilities the new member has and is willing to use and or share. Assign new members to projects and committees that utilize their talents and meet their areas of interest.
- Carpool to meetings. Sometimes the ride to and from the meeting can be a wonderful membership mixer and brainstorming session.
- ❖ Share GFWC News & Notes and Newletters and the GFWC-NC Clubwoman magazine with new members.

Tips for Successful Meetings

Time is valuable. Respect your members and plan your meetings. Keep on schedule and enlist a timekeeper for support, if needed. Members will appreciate it and they will be more likely to make GFWC a permanent fixture in their lives.

- ❖ Streamline meetings to ensure they are as convenient and productive as possible to meet the needs and diversity of your club members.
- Consider the time commitments of members and schedule meetings that accommodate as many members as possible.
- Include programs that are interesting and relevant.
- Email or mail the minutes and treasurer's report prior to the meeting to allow time for members to review
- ❖ Create an agenda Plan a 1 to 1 1/2 hour meeting.
- * Keep reports brief and pertinent.
- Allow time for discussion.
- Plan Social time either before or after the meeting. Refreshments and snacks can be a nice addition.

Food for Thought

- Encourage members to share why they joined the club and what they enjoy most about their membership and the Federation.
- ❖ Most members will say they came to a meeting because they were asked or invited.
- Provide a "safe" environment for members to give constructive criticism.
- Involve as many members in project development and discussion as feasible. Remember, all ideas are good!
- Offer club members a chance for personal growth as well as community service.
- ❖ Visit a nearby club to observe how other clubs function.
- ❖ Happy members are your greatest asset!

Things to Remember

Retaining members is everyone's responsibility: officers, board members, committee chairmen, and members at every level. Membership retention is successful when members are engaged!

- * Encourage participation at all levels of GFWC.
- Assess club programs and projects for their relevance and member interest.
- Maintain community connections.
- ❖ Show appreciation.
- Maintain a positive attitude.

Recognition: Little Things Mean a Lot

Say Thank You:

- "Great job; you made us all look good."
- * "Your efforts are really making a difference."
- "You are an inspiration to us all."
- * "Your help is much appreciated."
- * "We couldn't have done it without you."
- ❖ "You are a great team player, and the team thanks you!"

Assign an officer to call "no shows" or inactive members once a month to let them know they were missed and keep them informed with what is going on. Ask if they need a ride to the meetings and offer to give them one. Let members know that they are missed when they aren't there.

Recognition:

- Recognize and reward those members of your club who have been retained. Hold an end of the year celebration, or include them in a special program or the officer installation ceremony.
- ❖ Recognize and reward members who contribute to the well-being of the club/district/state. Everyone loves to know that her efforts are appreciated. Certificates, flowers, or prizes are just a few of the ways to thank and acknowledge a job well done, a positive attitude or even a perfect record of attendance.

Honor members who have belonged for 15 years, 25 years and every 5 years thereafter!

- ❖ GFWC offers 50 and 75 year pins, free of charge. All other pins are available through the GFWC Marketplace.
- ❖ GFWC-NC also allows clubs and families to pay tribute to members with Honorary Lifetime Memberships.

Plan for Success!

- Provide members with program, communication, fundraising, leadership, and membership "how to" materials. Members will appreciate the guidance and reference material to make their jobs easier and fun!
- Encourage leadership training. Leadership is vital to recruiting and retaining members.
- Prepare and train potential leaders for club, district, and state positions.
- ❖ Promote participation in the LEADS program.
- Celebrate Federation Day in April each year!
- Hold an orientation program for all members, focused on Federation.
- Publicize your club and member accomplishments in the community, on social media, and at GFWC-NC and GFWC.
- Encourage attendance at district and state meetings to learn about important program and Federation updates. Be sure to share the information with members.
